Aboard your catamaran, you'll experience the rare luxury of silence, flamboyant sunsets, secret ports of call, and the simple pleasures of stopping in coastal villages. Embark on a cruise in the Balearic Islands where nature, the sea, and the slowing down of time are the essence of the journey.

### VOTRE CROISIÈRE JOUR APRÈS JOUR

#### DAY 1 Palma – Cala Pi

Meet at the Port of La Lonja in Palma in the late afternoon. This historic district immediately immerses you in a warm Mediterranean atmosphere: cobbled streets, lively cafés, and the majestic silhouette of the Gothic cathedral watching over the harbor. After being welcomed by the crew, you gently leave the marina. Head east towards Cala Pi. Just an hour's sail away, this deep cove forms a narrow stretch of water between two golden cliffs. In the background, a golden sand beach, lined with pine trees, where the water takes on emerald hues at the end of the day. Perfect for a first swim before aperitif. Dinner and overnight at anchor, under the stars.

#### DAY 2 Cala Pi – Cala Figuera – Cala d'Or

This morning, head further east. Following the coast, you reach Cala Figuera, a still-active fishing port, where colorful boats pass by passing schooners. The village seems suspended in time, with its houses with green shutters, stone staircases, and fishing nets drying in the sun. A coffee on the quayside, a few local groceries, and off we go.

Late morning, head to Cala d'Or, whose numerous coves offer an ideal stopover for lunch and swimming. Its coves, nestled between pale cliffs, shelter incredibly transparent water. Paddleboarders can glide along the rocks.

Overnight at anchor in one of Cala d'Or's sheltered coves.







#### DAY 3 Cala d'Or – Cala Mondragó – Cala S'Amarador

Today's sailing will be short but full of wonders! You'll enter the Mondragó Natural Park, listed for its rich biodiversity. Limestone cliffs, dense pine forests, unspoiled beaches, and coastal paths create a breathtakingly beautiful setting. Stop at Cala Mondragó for a morning swim, then anchor for the night at Cala S'Amarador, larger and wilder. Between the two: a cliffside path, ideal for soaking up the surrounding nature. Here, in the evening, only birds and cicadas enliven the warm air. Overnight at anchor.

#### DAY 4 Cala S'Amarador - Crossing to Menorca – Cala Mitjana

Long departure for Menorca, the most unspoiled island in the archipelago. Allow approximately 6.5 hours of sailing, punctuated by the wind, reading, lunch at sea, or a nap in the shade of an awning. Upon arrival, a visual reward: Cala Mitjana. A pristine cove, surrounded by white cliffs, accessible only by boat or via a steep path. The water is clear and turquoise, bordered by a dense forest of pines and junipers. A magical swim before a peaceful evening away from it all.









#### DAY 5 Cala Mitjana – Ciutadella – Cala Turqueta

Leave Cala Mitjana to follow the west coast of Menorca to Ciutadella. The island's former capital, this charming aristocratic town will captivate you with its ochre stone streets, its cathedral, and its lively squares. The small harbor carved into the rock is a marvel. Stroll, sip a granizado, visit a market... Then head south again. Cala Turqueta awaits you: white sand, pale cliffs, wind-sculpted pine trees. The place lives up to its name. A dream cove for a relaxing afternoon, snorkeling, and an unforgettable sunset.

## DAY 6 Cala Turqueta – Crossing to Mallorca Es Trenc

Crossing back to Mallorca. It takes about 6 hours to sail to Es Trenc, one of the island's most famous beaches. A long strip of white sand bordered by shallow waters, Es Trenc is also a protected natural area, flanked by salt marshes where flamingos and wading birds nest. Nearby, the Campos salt flats produce dazzling white salt. Perfect for a stroll or a moment suspended between sky and sea.










#### DAY 7 Es Trenc – Cala Blava – Cala Portals Vells

Last day of coastal navigation. You head up the southwest coast for a stopover at Cala Portals Vells, an hour from Palma. This secluded cove has three small beaches, troglodyte caves, and a pine forest extending down to the sea. The water is a deep blue, and the late afternoon light is magical. In the evening, you'll enjoy your last dinner on board, sharing memories and silent contemplation.

#### DAY 8 Cala Portals Vells – Palma (La Lonja)

Early morning sail to Palma. As the cathedral reappears on the horizon, you slowly sink back into the real world. Disembark at 9 a.m. after breakfast on board. A last sip of coffee overlooking the port... and already the desire to set sail again.











































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
